In-Text Citation

The following guidelines are what you should expect if you use RefWorks Write-N-Cite with Harvard British Standard 2010 style for your in-text citations. They may also be followed if you enter your in-text citations manually.

Use of alternative conventions for in-text citations e.g those outlined in the School of Sport handbook are possible if you enter them manually. Check with module tutors on what is required.

To acknowledge a paraphrased idea put the reference information in brackets next to the idea used.

For example:

There is some evidence (Smith 1995) that these figures are incorrect.

OR

Smith (1995) has provided evidence that these figures are incorrect.

Multiple Authors

Where there are two or more authors enter only the first one followed by et al.

For example:

(Jarvie et al. 1997)

Quotations and Page numbers

When using direct quotations (remember to enclose direct quotations in inverted commas or quotation marks) or referring to particular sections of a document you must give the page numbers. Include the page numbers after the date within the brackets, use either a comma, or colon: to separate the date and page numbers. Abbreviations include: page (p.) pages (pp.) section (s.) and sections (ss.). If no page number is available (for example it has been taken from a web page use (n.p.)

For example:

Anschel et al. (2009) found " Women reported higher stress intensity for coach-related sources of acute stress and used approach-behavioral and avoidance-cognitive coping styles more often than did their male counterparts."
